The joy and smiles on their faces let everyone know that this was what they wanted to do – keep the legacy alive. The granddads, fathers, and husbands still living had similar smiles. The tenth member was a male youth member. This club realizes that Ruritan is a family organization.

The next touching event happened at a 50th anniversary. The club had informed me that I was to install a new member. The new member was the first youth member of the club. Now that club has new energy and new ideas, plus it has the opportunity to model service to this young person. I know the grandparents of this young man are proud that he is a fellow Ruritan family member.

The third experience happened while I was at a district picnic this spring, talking with a club past president. We were discussing how his club was like the Ruritan organization in that they add a few members and lose a few members. He then said of the losses, "if we keep the candle burning, there will always be the light of Ruritan." I encourage you and your club to keep that candle burning in your community and the communities around. This light will be seen by all.

I want to thank you for friendship and hospitality as Gail and I travel to your communities. I want to thank you for giving of your time and talents in the name of Ruritan, to make your communities and our America better places to raise our families.

The eight-hour conference focused on the theme of **Fresh Ideas Start Here** (FISH). Those participating were encouraged to think of new ways of looking at the challenges facing Ruritan today; in other words "thinking outside the bowl."

Vice President Phyllis Lewter and National President Jayson Duncan welcomed the group and encouraged the participants to "go against the flow" and stir up the waters with new ideas. Retired Radford University professor and national consultant Dr. Mike Aamodt presented challenges facing community service organizations and

shared research on characteristics of successful organizations. Executive Director Mike Chrisley shared challenges facing Ruritan National. Debbie Lineweaver from New River Community College provided strategies to overcome our challenges.

Informational sessions were conducted on various topics. Bruce Thompson reported on the National Ruritan Foundation; Jerome Rodes, financial issues' Mike Chrisley, legal issues; Craig Whitt, MMS; Don Yeargan and Chuck Myers, growth and development; Jayson Duncan, goals for 2011; and Phyllis Lewter, goal setting for 2012. Additionally, Convention Co-chairs Jimmy Bristow and Gary Taylor gave an update on the 2012 Raleigh National Ruritan Convention and Ruritan attire was modeled. Ruritan supplies were available for purchase.

Through out the conference, attendees from different districts and states enjoyed fellowship and shared projects and activities that worked well. Attendees were encouraged to post ideas on an "Idea Board." Some of the ideas posted included the following:

*Celebrate personal and club success more often

Work closely with high school counselors for youth Ruritan members (they are very valuable to a club with a high majority of elderly)

Create Knitted Caps for Cancer Patients Past National First Lady Martha Amick will be organizing the knit-

Past National First Lady Martha Amick will be organizing the knitters in Ruritan to create chemo caps during the 2012 Ruritan National Convention in Raleigh. Come planning to sit and knit a spell in your free time – or use the pattern below to create some caps in advance to bring to Raleigh.

Use knitting needles size 8 and 10 (2 each) Directions: Cast on 80 stitches on size #8 needles

K1, P1 for 1 3/4 inches. Change to size #10 knitting needles. ROW 1: Purl. ROW 2: Knit 1, Purl 1 across. Repeat rows 1 and 2 until cap measures 6 inches from beginning. 2nd and all even numbered rows: *k1, p1* across. 3rd row: *p1, p2tog* across.

5th row: repeat 1st row. 7th row: repeat 3rd row. 9th row: *p2tog* across.

TOP SHAPING: 1st row: *p2, p2tog* across.

Break off yarn leaving 18 inch tail. Draw yarn through remaining sts. Remove needle and pull tight. Fasten off on wrong side of cap. Sew seam.

This program has the potential of raising over one million dollars each year through participation by every Ruritan and Ruri-Teen by each saving ten cents per day. What a small amount each day to realize a large sum in just a one year time period. This program is set for an initial five year period which has a potential of raising between five and six million dollars.

Each and every Ruritan and Ruri-Teen are challenged to participate and encouraged to forward at least \$36.50 to the Foundation using the donation coupon on page 18. Your Foundation needs your help!

Your Trustee Board at a recent meeting made a couple of changes in the scholarship awards programs. In the "Build Your \$" program effective with the 2012/2013 program year the 45 day extension period beyond the April 1st cutoff date for receiving the student application package will no longer be available. Under the Regular Grants program and beginning with the 2011/2012 scholarship program, the Trustees will accept ACT/SAT grade transcripts for a minimum of six semesters (three years of grades).

Again, donations to either the Scholarship Program and/or the OWC program are tax deductible under our 501(c)3 designation by the Internal Revenue Service. Thanks for continued participation.
