National President Glen Broadwater's Convention Speech

Good evening my fellow Ruritans. What a different world it is. After two years of a roller coaster ride for everyone, and a near death experience for me, everything about the message I had planned on bringing to you has changed.

Lying in hospital bed on my stomach just trying to get another breath it came so clear to me what I needed to say.

You elected me to be your President and leader of this great organization in Kingsport, TN. Most of you know very little about me other than what you have learned in short time we have known each other. Therefore, I am sharing my background so you will know your President.

About your new President

I grew up in Rural Southwestern Virginia. My family was poor and very pessimistic. I was the opposite: optimistic. I always saw good in everything and an opportunity in the future. In elementary school I had a goal in life that I never shared with my family. They would not have understood. I wanted to change people's lives, so in my mind my personal goal was to give one million dollars away. I thought I understood the value of money, for we had very little. So, I set my sights on how I was going to accomplish this. I was the first to go to college in my family and I was paying for it myself, so I set out to get the most for my buck. I wanted to become a doctor, for I saw that they had money. I would go to the dean and get permission to take extra classes. I worked all the time when not studying. I majored in biology, chemistry, and math with minor in psychology. I didn't have the best advisors. Anyway, I got on the waiting list for medical school but didn't get in. Linda and I had met and dated all through school. We got married and found out we had a baby on the way three months later so that changed my goal. Being a father had become my most important thing.

At the time, the best money to made was in the coal mine and Linda's father helped me get a job. I always had a high aptitude for the mechanical side of things, so they kept me mostly as helper in maintenance. After a year everyone was required to go for safety training. While at the training center, I asked about getting into



the electrical training program. They informed me classes weren't being taught because of the economy and coal was down. I persisted and asked for the books, which they willingly gave to me.

Two weeks later I was back at their door wanting to know how I could take the tests. They informed me I couldn't. "Why not?" because I didn't have the math classes. I asked about the fact that I was a math major, so they told me to get my transcripts, which I did. When they looked at my transcripts, they realized I had taken everything they taught plus a lot

more. They signed off for me and I took the federal tests for "underground and above" for low, medium, and high voltage electrical. I finished my test before everyone else and I saw there were only 20 more questions for in the foreman's test, so I took it also. The next day I took my electrical certificates to the superintendent. He asked why I didn't take the foreman's test? I said I did. He wanted it also. So, I went from being a helper to being a foreman by simply testing out. There are folks today who will say that it can't be done. I am telling you anything is possible by working and setting your goal. The coal industry went on a downward spiral and

being the newest on the roster, I was laid off. So, I decided to change my direction in life. I was introduced, by a friend, to the financial world. So off I went to the library to find everything I could about it. I joined a company and about two years later I was vice president and moved my family to Minnesota. There I built an agency of 300 people with five vice presidents reporting to me. I have never completely left that work behind – doing a little every now and then. But big changes were going on at the time, so I was becoming frustrated.

A good friend convinced me that I should join him to build a company he was with. Everything was going well but being lax and not having a contract signed before we started caused our 20 percent of the company to evaporate even after we turned them from a struggling company to a very successful company. From there a couple friends and I bought, sold, and built companies. At that point I decided to move my family back to the mountains and went to work for a sales company, becoming a regional manager for them. A job without all the headaches! I even declined their offer to move to Ft. Worth to be General Manager.



I was able to get the small family farm that I grew up on where I tore the old house down and built Linda a new one. We bought more acreage and today we have about 400 acres and run around 100 head of commercial black angus cattle: cows, calves and four bulls.

So, why have I brought this up? Now you know my background. When I take on a project, I want it to be a success and the best.

What are we going to do to put Ruritan on the top?

I believe in a team and all working toward a common goal. Our slogan is One Team, One Direction: UP. I attended the Community Service Leaders Conference in Florida mid-November. My goal was to find the magic bullet to put Ruritan on top. I learned a lot but also found disappointments. The organizations that are growing are offshore and in other countries where folks are hungry for community. All the organizations concentrated in the United States are struggling. A lot are selling their assets and downsizing, a sign of an organization, or company, dying. There was no magic bullet. Why?

We have become very satisfied and complacent in our country. We are a country of plenty. That does not mean that our communities don't have a need for our services. They only need to hear about what we can do to help them become a better place to live and work.

We are at a critical point in our organization. If we don't change what we are doing, we will not exist as you know us today. So, it is up to us. I am not telling you anything that you don't already know. We cannot continue to lose clubs and be successful. Even the age of our membership is creeping up on us. We are not invincible.

The answer for our success is no different than it was when our organization was founded. Our founders saw there was a need. They identified communities that had the need. They introduced themselves and ideas to the leaders of the community. Together the leaders of the community and the Ruritan organizer built a club. Did all the clubs they form become a success? The answer is no. Did that stop them from continuing? Again, the answer is no. You elected me to lead. Together we will make Ruritan the greatest community service organization there ever has been.



Our goal for 2022 is to form 160 clubs.

Take a deep breath and get over the shock. This is really a very low goal. There are 41 districts and areas in our organization. That is only four clubs per district and area to be created. We have lost this number in the last few years.

I know this can be accomplished and more. Please erase from your mind that you have to hold their hand for five years. Our founders never held their hands. I can assure you that the cream will come to the top. You are leaders here. Let's go together and lead.

I would like for each of you to stand and address your neighbor (spoken to the attendees at the 2022 Installation Banquet). Please say: "I am on the TEAM, and WE will SUCCEED." You may be seated.

One of my favorite Bible chapters is Luke 19, verses 11 thru 26 - the parable of the ten minas. I am going to paraphrase. Christ was talking about a very harsh man who was going to be king. The man called ten of his servants and gave each a sum of money to take care of. When he returned as King, he called each servant back. He asks the first servant how his money had grown. The servant replied it had grown by tenfold. He put him in charge of ten cities. He asks the second servant the same and he replied it had grown fivefold and he put him in charge of five cities. He called the third servant and the

servant replied that he had put the money in a sack and kept it because he feared the harsh man. The king replied since he knew he was a harsh man, "why didn't you at least deposit it and let it earn Interest?" He took the money away from him and gave it to the first servant. The crowd replied but doesn't he have enough? He replied, "isn't it true that those who have more get more, and those who have little soon lose even that." This parable is not about money but about stewardship.

2022 Convention Recap



The 2022 Ruritan National Convention held in Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, was a memorable, informational, and educational convention. National officers were elected and installed, awards were presented, donations were given, business was conducted, and Ruritans enjoyed fellowship. Spartan and Columbia Districts were the welcoming districts.

On Thursday, January 6, the convention opened with exhibits and Ruritan Supply.



President Elect Glen Broadwater led the training of the 2022 Ruritan National District Governors. Thursday afternoon workshops included club officer training as well as Ruritan Finances. A first timers reception was held on Thursday afternoon where 80 first time convention attendees were welcomed by President Linward. On Thursday evening, the official opening of the convention began with the Flag Ceremony and recognition of veterans. The flag ceremony was presented by 2022 Rocky Mt-Durham District Secretary and current National Director Ron Reid. Ron also introduced the Honor and Remembrance Flag and the Gold Star Mother Robyn Dudley. (Ssgt Thomas J. Dudley's mother.) Ending the evening was military speaker, George Lutz who is the founder of the Honor and Remembrance Organization. Past National Director Grover Burkett carried the memorial torch.



Friday's activities began with the business session. 2021 Rudy Youth of the Year Award was presented to Aarons Creek Club member Thomas Overton. 2021 Ruri-Teen of the Year Award was presented to Chattanooga Central High School Ruri-Teen Club member Sarah Latham. 2021 Ruritan of the Year Award was presented to Fran Bristow of the Pineview Club. The Fellowship Lunch was held after the business session. During the lunch over



350 Rudy Bears were donated to the Caleb's Dragonfly Dreams organization. Ashley Edwards, mother of Caden Edward, gave an insightful first-hand experience of how St. Jude Children's Research Hospital cared for her child. Friday night concluded with First Lady Anne's event held at Medieval Times Dinner and Show. Attendees cheered for their knight to win the tournament, ate a meal fit for a king or queen, and watched President Linward and First Lady Anne get knighted.



Saturday began with the second business meeting where the election results were announced, reports given, and awards were presented. The seven (7) bylaw issues that were in the Fall/Winter Ruritan Magazine, pages 22-25, were all passed by the delegates. A St. Jude "No More Cancer" rally was held on Saturday afternoon. This rally was to help raise money for the patients to have a "No More Cancer" party at the end of their treatments. The Installation Banquet concluded Saturday's events. 2022 National President Glen Broadwater, President Elect Mike Morrison, National Secretary James Mills, National Treasurer David Thompson, and seven three-year National Directors (Roger Davis, Cassandra Flanagan, Lynn Fillers, Perry Marshman, Zackary McCallie, Donna Jo Poulton and Ron Reid) were installed. Dennis Bagnell was installed to fill the unexpired term and Josh Adams was installed as Foundation Trustee. The evening ended with a performance by Landau Eugene Murphy Jr.

He will kick off his conference Friday with a community service project for attendees to participate in at Mill Mountain Zoo. See pages 11 - 12 for more details. After the project is complete, the opening session of the conference will take place and dinner will be provided by Missions BBQ. We will be collecting Rudy Bears for DePaul Community Resources of Roanoke. Their mission is to ensure safety, promote permanency, facilitate healing, and support independence for the children and families they serve. They do this through foster care, adoption, independent living, and community-based services.

All-Day-Break starts at 7:00 a.m. This includes pastries, coffee, soda, and breakfast sandwiches. Training will start at 8:00 a.m. on Saturday, June 18, at The Hotel Roanoke's Lecture Hall. **Current Lt. Governors are expensed to this conference. Lt. Governors are required to attend this conference to be eligible for reimbursement of one half of their National Convention expenses.**

Current District Governors and Zone Governors are highly recommended to attend.

One area of concern for all Ruritan members is the growth of the organization. We will have some "experts" that have built Ruritan membership and Ruritan Clubs who will give some useful advice on how you can build your clubs and districts. President Elect Mike and the Leadership Committee are planning the training around the theme: **"Put Ruritan in your Heart"** There will be information that will benefit all Ruritans.

The conference gives Ruritan leaders the opportunity to learn more about their responsibilities, share ideas, express concerns, and plan for the future of the organization.

It also provides an opportunity for leaders to learn about the responsibilities that go along with other leadership positions they may wish to seek and encourages them to move up in their leadership roles. The conference brings Ruritan leaders together to discuss concerns and plan for the future of the organization. Attendees will also learn the latest information about Ruritan programs and procedures.

As stated earlier, Lt. Governors are expensed to this conference. Others may attend at their own expense and for a nominal registration fee. Special circumstances such as substitutions will be considered on a case by case basis by the Ruritan National President.

**All expense vouchers must be submitted within 90 days after the 2023 National Convention.



New Ruritan Forever Incentive for 2022

Ruritan members who participate in the Ruritan Forever program, either by making the purchase themselves or having been given the Ruritan Forever distinction, are planting trees under whose shade they will not sit. They are guaranteeing the continuation of their beloved Ruritan organization.

With every Ruritan Forever membership, the organization is assured an annual endowment equal to a year of national dues after the member passes on.

In 2022, Ruritan will continue to focus on the Ruritan Forever program under the guidance of President Glen Broadwater and First Lady Linda. For this year, each New Ruritan Forever recipient throughout 2022, will receive a Ruritan Forever Polo at no charge. This high-quality Polo has the Holland Monument embroidered and resembles the Ruritan Forever Pin.

What is a Ruritan Forever?

“Ruritan Forever” is a plan for the payment of **national** dues by members who wish to make a long term investment in Ruritan. The “Ruritan Forever” plan allows a member in good standing to pay \$600 and become a life-time participant of the National Organization. Ruritan National will invest these pre-payments in a special managed fund, transferring the dues quarterly to the business office of Ruritan National. Even after the life participant dies, dues will be transferred quarterly to Ruritan National, thus offering a perpetual memorial to the organization on behalf of the deceased Ruritan.

A “Ruritan Forever” endowment may be purchased by a member in good standing or may be purchased for a member in good standing. A Ruritan Forever endowment may be purchased to honor a non-member provided they are brought into a club as an Associate Member at the same time. In this case the Associate Member’s dues would be covered by the \$600 endowment.

The lifetime endowment may also be purchased in memory of an already deceased Ruritan, ensuring an ongoing contribution to the operation of Ruritan in his or her name. Dues for a living participant must be current through the previous quarter to participate. Ruritan National will administer these prepaid dues in a separate fund with the original amount remaining in perpetuity. Interest on the fund will provide the money paid to Ruritan National for dues.

Upon payment of the fee, the Ruritan will receive a certificate, a lapel pin, and a permanent life participant card. For endowments purchased for a deceased member a special plaque will be provided for the club to present to the deceased member’s family. **National** dues increases will have no effect on participants enrolled in the plan, although the purchase price of \$600 for new enrollees may be adjusted over the years as necessary. There will be no special assessments or charges made to Ruritan Forever participants.

We Look Forward to a Successful 2022

First, on behalf of the Ruritan National Foundation, I would like to thank Brent Wheeler for serving as President of your Ruritan National Foundation for 2020 and 2021. Though her service was unique, it allowed the Ruritan National Foundation Trustees

to determine that the business of the RNF could be handled effectively and efficiently through Teams meetings and email.

Second, I want to highlight some of the accomplishments of your Ruritan National Foundation in 2020 and 2021.

Through the efforts of the Trustees, many of the exceptions with the Endowed/Contract funds have been corrected. In addition, ALL new contracted funds use one of the two contract options: Perpetual or 20-year limited term.

The RNF Trustees have continue to meet with the Investment Advisor during this time period to protect the principal of the Foundation while continuing to allow growth.

The RNF Trustees realized that the Operation We Care program was not structured to allow the best service to our Ruritan communities. We began discussions with the Ruritan National Board to find a way for the Operation We Care program to be restructured to better serve our communities.

The RNF Trustees strived to be proactive during this unique time over the last two years especially in the education world. As such, we extended several deadlines to allow scholarship awards to be claimed.

In addition, we began discussions around how to make the Build Your Dollar program more attractive for our Ruritan Clubs. Several options are being discussed and will be rolled out over the next several years. BUT for the first time, for 2022 award year the Foundation's BY\$ award will be \$750. This is a 150% return on your club's \$300 deposit. As a reminder, the Build Your Dollar claim form must be returned to the RNF office not later than June 30, 2022.

Tom Downing Fellows continue to be a major funding source for the Ruritan National Foundation. As a

reminder, a Tom Downing Fellowship is an excellent way to recognize a Ruritan or non-Ruritan. Through the generosity of an anonymous donor, there are 20 matching grants available to help fund Tom Downing Fellowships. The district, club, or individual who wants to award the Tom Downing Fellowship will need to contact the Ruritan National Foundation office to get details. The matching grant will fund \$250 of the \$500 donation and is on a first come first service basis.

For two years, the RNF Trustees have proactively cancelled Foundation Weekend. It is the intention of the Trustees to have Foundation Weekend in 2022. More information will be coming soon.


Past National Presidents Jim McKinney and Richard Weakley Pass Away

1991 Ruritan National President Richard A. Weakley, 96, passed away January 31, 2022 in Midlothian, Va. He was preceded in death by his loving wife of 66 years, Clara D. Weakley. He is survived by his children, Lynne Weakley Cox and Richard A Weakley Jr.; as well as daughter-in-law, Noriko Weakley. He is also survived by his beloved grandchildren, Maya and Keiden Weakley, Zach Cox and his wife, Ali and their daughter, Virginia.

Richard was born on June 22, 1925 in Lynchburg, Va. to the late Pelham and Ethel Weakley. His life was marked by service to his country and community. Ruritan Loses Four Past National Directors




Ararat Serves Children and Seniors in Community

All Ruritan members are entitled to view and edit their own data in the system and officers can make other changes and updates. If you haven't used the MMS before your Ruritan staff can get you set up. Just email service@ruritan.org and staff will help you access the system.


